Sometime in the mid seventies Maureen Copping told me about a hilarious Ayckbourn play that she had seen in London with a wonderful part for me in it. It was a fanatical housewife who locks herself out in the rain during her own Xmas drinks party. As fate would have it some time later I was cast in it with Keith Railton as my husband and his wife Jane as the suicidal Eva. Amazingly it was lit by newcomer Ian Knight and the sound operator was new member Dave Cornish! So here we are again reunited in different roles with lan and Dave heading their departments. We all had a whale of a time and the original production was hugely popular. As part of our 50th celebration Keith has chosen this play as one of the Criterion past successes to be revived.

Alan Ayckbourn is probably our most popular playwright. Based since 1959 at the Stephen Joseph Theatre in Scarborough where he is artistic Director he has written over 80 plays translated into 40 languages and performed throughout the world. In 1997 he received a knighthood for his services to the theatre.

Absurd Person Singular was first performed in London atThe Criterion Theatre! The play revolves around 3 dysfunctional marriages resulting in three neurotic wives. It is familiar Ayckbourn territory, hilarious situations with pain at the core. Comedy can be a very cruel affair. We are presenting the play in the seventies as it is very much of it's time in its attitudes and philosophy and specifics such as the new fitted kitchen, gadgetry and labour saving devices. Ayckbourn writes so brilliantly about relationships and the darker side of human nature that Peter Hall says he will probably be being performed in a hundred years time. This play will probably become a classic!


A Day in the Death of Joe Egg by Peter Nichols

Jane Railton

In more recent years two of her favourite roles were Mrs. Nickleby in David Edgar's adaptation of Dickens' "Nicholas Nickleby", and Mrs. Betterton in "Playhouse Creatures". Although they have worked together in many productions, including the Criterion's 1977 production of 'Absurd Person Singular', this is the first time Jane and husband Keith have played a married couple on stage.

Keith Railton first joined the Criterion in 1965 and in 1977 played the part of Sidney Hopcroft in their first production of Absurd Person Singular. His more recent appearances at the Criterion have been as Fagin in Oliver Twist, Marc in Art, Sigmund Freud in Hysteria, Frank in The Memory of Water, the General in And Then There Were None and Jaggers in Great Expectations. He has also directed Treasure Island, Oh! What a Lovely War, Brassed Off, The Graduate and The Herbal Bed. Keith is currently Artistic Director of the Criterion.

Trev Clarke

This is Trev's third appearance at The Criterion, after Blue Remembered Hills (2009) and Pleasure & Repentance (2010). He has also appeared at other local theatres and, before that, Nottingham and Leicester.
